

Will Texas protect against waste and abuse?

Don't Arizona (or Florida) our Texas schools!

In **Arizona**, a TV station investigation of approved voucher spending found:

- \$3,400 for one purchase at a golf store
- \$10,000 for one purchase at a sewing machine company
- \$19,000 for 100+ passes to Arizona Snowbowl Ski Resort
- \$100,000 for extravagant appliances that freeze dry food (\$3,000 each)
- \$350,000 for "Ninja Warrior" training centers, trampoline parks, & climbing gyms
- \$400,000 for trendy, indoor hydroponic tower gardens that cost \$1,000 each
- \$1.2 million for martial arts instruction¹

Additional approved purchases included kayaks, cowboy roping lessons,² & at least \$1 million worth of Legos, including 84 Lego sets that cost \$500+ each.³

In **Florida**, lawmakers in 2023 expanded access to the state's voucher program, while at the same time giving parents more ways to spend the public funds offered. Allowable expenses include:

- 55-inch TVs (over \$1.2 million spent)
- Stand-up paddleboards
- Treadmills (over \$43,000 spent)
- Trampolines (over \$30,000 spent)
- Game consoles (over \$225,000 spent)
- Kayaks⁴
